LETTER FROM BRYAN WILLIAMS



During my MBA program, I participated in an activity I have never forgotten throughout my career. The final week before graduation, we were partnered with a student in a different cohort with the goal of acquiring what was written on a notecard that was handed to us moments before we began negotiations. Purposefully, we had never met or interacted with the student across from us. Was this person trustworthy? Would this person lie to achieve the goal? There was no way to know.

Armed with years of a training through the rigorous program, we thought we were deft negotiators, and each side was ready to win, unwilling to give up an inch to get what we wanted. Each side held information close to the vest, fearing that a slip of the tongue would give the other side leverage. Hours passed and as the deadline for completing negotiations

neared, panic set in. The assignment had to be completed on time or we would not be allowed to walk with our class. In the end, each side caved, neither getting exactly what we wanted. It was easy to see dejection on faces as students returned to the lecture hall. The professors in the room asked, who achieved the goals they were assigned? Zero hands were raised into the air.

Two professors faced each other, and one asked, what goals are you trying to achieve? Holding nothing back, one of the professors read verbatim the goals written on his notecard. The other professor did the same. Each traded their respective notecard and began discussing how they could work together to help each other. In five minutes, an agreement was reached, and a partnership was born. Many students left upset, complaining of a trick assignment, and wasted time. I left with an invaluable lesson, thinking back to many wasted opportunities. I've brought that attitude to working with people, organizations, and businesses ever since. If we start from a place of trust, believing that together we can accomplish more, true partnerships are born.

Dogs for Better Lives' mission is bigger than one organization. We know that the demand for the amazing dogs we train and place with the clients we serve may never be met. To change more lives, we must look outside our walls. We must look at ways in which people, businesses, and organizations can work together to accomplish more. For partnerships to be true partnerships, we must begin from a place of trust, share common goals, and define how we can work together to accomplish these goals. We are humble enough to recognize that we need help to get to where we want to go.

One of my favorite authors is Simon Sinek who says, "Trust emerges when we have a sense that another person or organization is driven by things other than their own self-gain." This is critical to effective partnerships and we, at Dogs for Better Lives, feel it is so important that we built it into our 'why'. At Dogs for Better Lives, we believe it's an honor to be a part of something bigger than ourselves and we're impassioned with what we do. Operating as a team, we put the mission above the individual, trusting in one another to break through challenges and obstacles to maintain our mission of bettering lives by matching people with the amazing dogs we train.

If we truly aim to grow the reach of our mission and become the organization we envision, we must rely on partnerships to take us across the finish line. FD RUTH & ALLISON

Facility Dog Ruth was placed with Allison in American Fork, Utah. Allison is a teacher in a special education classroom for elementary school-aged children. Allison and Ruth quickly bonded and developed a great working relationship. Although this is Allison's first dog as an adult, she naturally took to the training process and said that it was very similar to working with young children.

Ruth is a fixture in Allison's classroom as she helps to reward good behavior from the children and makes trying new things less scary. Ruth works place, settle, squish (lap/lower back), visit, touch, shake, high five, and retrieve for Allison.

Allison said that she is excited to have Ruth and that she can see the impact her

presence and tasks have on the students in her classroom and the school. She's also happy to have Ruth as her pet at home so she can go on long walks to explore local parks and get all the puppy snuggles that she's been missing out on.

At placement, Allison said that her favorite memory was when they were training at the school. A few students had approached Ruth to pet her, and Allison was explaining that Ruth was going to be coming to class each day to work in their home room. The look of pure shock and happiness that spread over the kids' faces was impactful to Allison and she said it made her so excited to get to work!



AAD TAYLOR & JAMES

WASHINGTON

Autism Assistance Dog Taylor was placed with James in Spokane, Washington. James' family applied for an Autism Assistance dog and have been on the wait list for 2 years. They were very excited when they were offered Taylor.

After meeting Taylor, the family quickly warmed up to her, with James referring to her as his new dog sister. James is a little shy and can struggle to make friends, but Taylor is an excellent match that helps bring him out of his shell. James' parents said they were most excited for Taylor to be a social bridge in public spaces, hopefully bringing people towards James and helping him to build social skills and engage more.

James is most excited for Taylor to work the deep pressure therapy tasks for him like squish and lap. Taylor will also be working touch, visit, and settle. Although James doesn't use anchoring, he does have his own leash attached to her vest in public that prevents James from wandering and keeps him more focused.

HHD FERN & LEAH OREGON

Home Hearing Dog Fern was placed with Leah in Portland, Oregon. Fern came to DBL in November of 2020 from Southeastern Guide dogs in Florida. Back in April, DBL learned it would be best for Fern to be a Home Hearing Dog to help avoid putting her in uncomfortable situations with public restrooms and tight spaces. This was also a deciding factor to try and avoid sending her to a client that required flying.

Leah and her spouse both work in the forestry field and are a very active couple. They enjoy backpacking, hiking, rock climbing, marathon running, swimming, and being outdoors which is perfect for Fern and her ability to keep up with an active lifestyle.

Fern was a quick learner with sound work and was eager to alert her handler to sounds. Those sounds include oven timer, smoke alarm, alarm clock, door knock, doorbell, telephone, and name call. . Leah grasped the sequence of sound work with ease, and near the end was able to problem-solve and help decide how to work through challenges. Leah was instantly smitten with Fern and said that Fern warmed up to their home and settled in nicely.



AAD LIZ & ROWAN

OREGON

Autism Assistance Dog Liz was placed with Rowan in Oregon. Rowan and their family have waited 2 1/2 years for Liz. Rowan's parents talked about how hard it was for Rowan, waiting to be matched. When Rowan was asked if Liz was worth the wait Rowan said, "Absolutely. Without a doubt. She's wonderful!"

Liz does visit, lap, squish, touch, and settle with Rowan. Rowan is a great trainer

and has Liz doing all the cues, often showing their parents how it's done. Liz also knows a few tricks like fetch and shake and Rowan LOVES showing that off to folks.

Liz slept on the bed the first night with Rowan and every night after that. After that first night, Rowan said, "It was just so wonderful. Liz took up a lot of the bed, but I still slept so well. I think it's because I was so warm and loved." Rowan was eager to take on responsibility and gladly measures and feeds Liz her meals and goes out into the yard with her each time she potties to clean up after her.

WEST VIRGINIA

Certified Hearing Dog Waldo was placed with successor client Diana in West Virginia. Diana is absolutely thrilled with Waldo and said the second day of placement that, "it feels like he's just always been here." He's working the door knock, doorbell, phone, alarm clock, smoke alarm, and kitchen timer.

Certified Hearing Dog Tesla was placed with successor client Winona (Noni) in San Luis Obispo, California. This is her third dog from Dogs for Better Lives. Tesla is working oven timer, doorbell, cell phone, landline phone, smoke alarm, RV smoke alarm, and door knocks in the RV.

Tesla has changed Noni's life in so many ways. Noni feels more comfortable and confident going out and is planning an RV trip, which she hasn't felt comfortable doing since she lost her last dog.



HHD POPPY & ALLISON CONNECTICUT

Home Hearing Dog Poppy was placed with Allison of Connecticut. Allison is a college student who lives with her fiancé Jack. Poppy alerts Allison to the oven timer, phone, smoke alarm, doorbell, door knock, alarm clock, and name call. Poppy worked these sounds with ease at placement and both Allison and Jack were impressed with how quickly she took to working sounds in their home.

Allison says the thing she enjoys the most is when Poppy wakes her up to the alarm each morning, and the companionship that Poppy provides.



AAD SERENITY & LUKE

Autism Assistance Dog Serenity was placed with Luke in Portland, Oregon. Luke had been patiently waiting on the waitlist for almost 3 years.

Serenity is the perfect calm dog to help keep Luke grounded and refocus his nervous energy. Luke's mom says that his anxiety usually comes out in excited outbursts, compulsive behaviors, and movement, and Serenity has helped from day one to promote more stillness and calm. His parents said that his anxiety appears to be much lower since Serenity joined the household. Luke seeks tactile

stimulation, and Serenity provides that while also providing deep pressure when needed. Luke's mom recalled one day that Luke was wearing his glasses, something he normally never does. It was because the glasses are blue, and they match Serenity's vest.

Luke's favorite tasks are Squish and Lap. Serenity is also working touch, visit and settle. Luke isn't using anchoring, but he does have his own leash attached to her vest that he enjoys holding and keeps him from wandering. He made sure to tell all his friends and neighbors, "she knows a lot of behaviors, but doesn't know shake... can you believe that?"

CONNECTICUT

Home Hearing Dog Poppy and Alli have been working together for a little over 5 months and Alli says she truly feels Poppy is her "soul dog" and that they have the greatest bond. Alli loves spoiling Poppy and that Poppy absolutely loves swimming, playing in the snow, and playing fetch.

CHD - CERTIFIED HEARING DOG

Certified Hearing Dogs respond to sounds in the home and have Public Access with their person.

HHD – HOME HEARING DOG

Home Hearing Dogs are trained to respond to sounds in the home but are not trained/certified to accompany their person in public.

FD - FACILITY DOG

Facility Dogs go to work with and assist professionals such as physicians, teachers, counselors, police officers, and child advocates.

AAD – AUTISM ASSISTANCE DOG

Autism Assistance Dogs are trained to enhance the safety of children with autism by acting as an anchor and preventing the child from bolting. person.

DOGS FOR BETTER LIVES NORTHEAST TRAINING CAMPUS OFFICIALLY OPEN

On Tuesday, April 26, 2022, the Northeast Campus of Dogs for Better Lives (DBL) officially opened to the public. Members of the DBL Board and staff joined the community for a ribbon cutting event with the Cape Cod and Falmouth Chambers of Commerce. Members of the community were welcome to attend the event where they toured the fully renovated facility, met DBL puppies-in-training, and spoke with staff.

The facility will operate as a boarding and dog daycare facility for the public and will also offer training and kennel space for our Assistance Dogs in training.

In 2020, DBL's Vision and four-year strategic plan focused on the growth and expansion needed to acquire and professionally train more Assistance Dogs across the United States. The new Northeast Campus will make it possible to provide more Assistance Dogs to people in need across the eastern U.S., without relying on costly cross-country transportation from our West Coast Campus.

"This is an exciting milestone for Dogs for Better Lives. The demand for Assistance Dogs is greater than ever, and our new Northeast Campus will help us place more dogs, in the northeast and across the nation. The high-quality facility we're unveiling today is a true testament to the tireless work of our staff," said CEO Bryan Williams.

The Falmouth facility was purchased in May of 2021 and was briefly open to the public before closing for the fall and winter months for a full renovation. Thanks to donor support, kennels have been renovated, higher-quality flooring has been installed, and the outside exercise yards were upgraded to bring the facility into the modern era, providing a safe and clean space for all dogs on-site.

"We can't wait to welcome Assistance Dogs in training to our new campus soon," stated executive director – northeast region, Sarah McCracken. "We've come a long way with renovations and building connections in the community. To support this next phase, we're eager to recruit more puppy raisers in the Northeast."

DBL is looking for puppy raisers and breeder caretakers in Maine, Vermont, New Hampshire, New York, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, DC, Maryland, Delaware, West Virginia & Virginia to continue to build the volunteer network necessary to train and place more dogs. In the summer of 1993, Harry & David made their first corporate gift to Dogs for the Deaf (now Dogs for Better Lives) in tribute to one of their employees. of the West Coast Campus' original kennels built in the early 1980s. And then, suddenly, the COVID-19 pandemic devastated the world. The DBL campus closed, and most staff worked remotely as much as possible.



The Partnerships in Excellence program built around quarterly meetings and corporate mixers, had to pause.

In late 2021 when the world began to re-open, it became apparent that the model would need to be revamped. This would not hinder Harry & David's commitment to partnering with DBL - on the contrary. Their commitment had only grown stronger as they looked for ways to care for their community members. Last year, Harry & David's philanthropic support made an impact on the well-being and health of dogs in training and puppies whelped through a gift insupport of veterinarian care.

FOSTER PUPPIES IN CALIFORNIA

There are many exciting milestones happening in California! The four of the five original puppies who were with puppy raisers in California have been returned to our Oregon campus for official Assistance Dog task training – of the five, one was released before official training started for skin allergies.

Since their return, one of the dogs, Cedar – who couldn't quite make it as an Assistance Dog due to his separation anxiety – was transferred Working Dogs Oregon to be placed as a Therapy Dog/Victim Support Dog with Oregon State University Police Department. Thus, giving DBL an opportunity to provide another life-changing dog! The three remaining dogs are doing well and remain in training to become Assistance Dogs.

We now have four new puppies in foster care in California:

- A 7-month Lab in the Sacramento area who came to us from the ABC Co-op.
- A 7-month Mini-Doodle currently in the San Francisco area donated by Brigadoon Service Dogs in Washington.
- A 4-month labradoodle in the San Jose area, and a 4-month labradoodle in Ojai both donated from KC & CO Labradoodles in Arkansas.

The puppies are thriving in their puppy raiser homes – gaining a variety of experiences and learning general obedience. We're delighted to have two successor puppy raisers back raising a puppy with us again!

Last yet certainly not least, we currently have a shelter dog in training in California. The dog was procured from our rescue partner Valley Animal Haven in Lemoore, California. They have a staff trainer that works with the dogs, so most of the dogs have some training upon rescue. The little guy is doing well, adjusting, and learning how to behave in public.

We are so thankful to the network of rescue partners, assistance dog organization partners, breeders, and our volunteer puppy raisers and breeder caretakers! The partnerships we have are instrumental as we expand our services and broaden our networks to continue to change and better lives.

Fostering is a great way to help our dogs through various stages of their stay with Dogs for Better Lives. **We have three categories available so that you can choose one that best fits your lifestyle:**



Transitional. You provide a home for our newly recruited Assistance Dogs before they are transported to Southern Oregon for professional training. Most of our dogs recruited from a shelter environment benefit strongly from time in a foster home to ease with this transition.

Assisting. You assist a dog currently in professional training at our center in Southern Oregon. Some of our dogs find kennel life stressful, providing a shortterm home while they are still training to become a certified Assistance Dog can make all the difference. This is a fantastic opportunity if you live close by a Dogs for Better Lives facility.

Giving. You give a post training home to one of our Career Change dogs awaiting adoption. The Assistance Dog career isn't always the path for every dog – with basic training from our certified trainers, these dogs make wonderful family pets! This category requires the flexibility to transport dogs to/from Dogs for Better Lives for meet and greets with adopters.
