How Certified Hearing Dog Chowder Transformed a Teacher's Life

When John, a teacher at Innovation Academy Experiential Learning High School in Oregon, first met Certified Hearing Dog Chowder, he wasn't sure what to expect. After years of grappling with hearing loss, John had long resisted the idea of a Service Dog. But as he reflected on how he coped with missing everyday sounds and the limitations it brought to his life, he decided to apply. Eventually, the time came for a placement, and that's when Chowder entered John's world—and changed it forever.

From the very start, Chowder impressed John. His enthusiasm for training and his calm demeanor at home, especially around John's kids, led to an instant bond. Chowder quickly adapted to his new role, alerting John to important sounds like the door knock, oven timer, and alarm clock at home. And his method of alerting—a firm tap before leading John to the sound—made John burst out laughing every time. Chowder was not only a capable worker but also a joyful presence that made life at home lighter.

John was particularly excited about how Chowder would help him gain independence and companionship. Working as a teacher in a bustling classroom, it used to be hard for John to keep track of alarms or phone calls amidst the ambient chatter of his students. But Chowder made all the difference. "No matter what Chowder is doing, he'll perk up and zoom over to me anytime a sound goes off," John shared. With Chowder by his side, John feels a renewed sense of confidence in managing his environment, knowing that important sounds won't be missed.

Chowder became an integral part of John's classroom, both working quietly at his feet and serving as an educational tool for the students. John was eager to teach his class how Service Dogs can assist individuals with disabilities, and Chowder was the perfect example.

Reflecting on his journey to apply for a Hearing Dog, John admitted that he had initially resisted the idea.

I just turned 50. The possibility of a Hearing Assistance Dog first came up for me when I was in my mid-20s. I was reluctant as a youngster for a variety of reasons—but pride was certainly one of them. I avoided accepting my limitations for a long time and paid a price for it. What changed for me was I wasn't able to cope like I used to, but also that I had less interest in pretending to be something I wasn't. I wish I'd opened up to the idea of a service dog sooner. Chow's not just a helper. He's a symbol of my acceptance of myself. ??

One of the most touching examples was when Chowder began alerting to the whistle John's family uses to find each other in public. "Previously, I'd miss this sound quite a bit, but now Chowder alerts me anywhere in public and helps me figure out which of my family members is trying to find me," John said. "I didn't teach this to Chowder; he just started picking it up since the family does it so often."

John's journey with Chowder is not just about navigating the sounds of everyday life—it's about reclaiming independence, embracing his hearing loss, and finding a constant companion who understands his unique needs.

He's validating my experience as someone who hears the way I do: inconsistently and imperfectly. Chowder has made me more independent. He's given me room to create some space for myself. As it turns out, this is a big deal. 99

Children feel less fearful during medical visits when Facility Dogs provide gentle pressure and a calming presence


Emotional Support

With Carla at the Oregon Research Institute, Kelly helps patients feel more comfortable before medical procedures like blood draws. In Jessica's role as an Occupational Therapist, Kelly assists with deep pressure tasks, and the kids she works with love ending their sessions with a hand touch from Kelly as a fun goodbye. Kelly's skills in lap, squish, touch, and settle are seamless across both roles, and both handlers demonstrated flawless public access and task obedience. Outside of work, Kelly enjoys living with Carla and their other dog, Andy, with whom he shares playful mornings and evenings. Kelly has also adapted wonderfully to accompanying Carla to pet-friendly spots in Eugene and traveling around the Pacific Northwest. Both Carla and Jessica are thrilled with how well Kelly has adjusted and how fantastic he is in both his work and home life.

CHD - Certified Hearing Dog: Certified Hearing Dogs respond to sounds in the home and have public access with their person.

AAD - Autism Assistance Dog: Autism Assistance Dogs are specially trained to enhance the safety and well-being of children and families living with Autism by providing a minimum of three tasks to assist with keeping children grounded and focused while presenting a social bridge for relationships and friendships.

HHD - **Home Hearing Dog:** Home Hearing Dogs are trained to respond to sounds in the home but are not trained/certified to accompany their person in public.

FD - Facility Dog: Facility Dogs go to work with and assist professionals such as physicians, teachers, counselors, police officers, and child advocates.

For now, she is thrilled to finally sleep soundly, knowing that Dax will be there to alert her and provide confidence wherever she goes.

CHD Emerald and Joyce

Certified Hearing Dog Emerald has been placed with Joyce in Washington. Joyce, a retired teacher, applied for a Hearing Dog after her previous privately trained dog passed away, and she was eager to begin working with Emerald. She fondly compared the differences between her former dog and Emerald, who quickly bonded with her and embraced the work. By the second day, Emerald was happily settling between Joyce's legs, enjoying the affection while we chatted. Both Joyce and her husband, Mike, were enthusiastic about adding name call to Emerald's list of sounds, and they enjoyed practicing it together. In public, Joyce is excited to have Emerald as a social bridge to help her engage with people more and as a signal of her hearing loss. At home, Emerald will be alerting to the oven timer, door knock, smoke alarm, and name call, helping Joyce feel confident and connected.

Home Hearing Dog Annie has been placed with Anna Mary in Virginia, marking a special milestone as Annie is the first hearing dog from the shelter-to-service program in collaboration with Operation Kindness in Texas. Annie quickly settled into her new home and formed a strong bond with Anna Mary, as if she instinctively knew she was her person. Living in a neighborhood with great walking paths, Annie will enjoy plenty of exercise alongside her new companion. Annie is working on alerting to the kitchen timer, door knock, and name call, helping Anna Mary stay aware of important sounds. With two of Anna Mary's adult children currently living with her, along with five kids and three grandchildren in total, Annie is sure to be surrounded by plenty of love and attention in her new family!
