Facility Dog Melvin Brings Joy, Comfort, and Connection to the Classroom

When Facility Dog Melvin walks into Andrea's classroom each morning, the atmosphere instantly shifts. Students and staff alike light up at the sight of him, eager for their daily dose of "Melvin time."

Melvin brings a sense of joy to the classroom; he lightens the mood," said Andrea, a special education teacher and Melvin's handler. "The kids are happy to see him which makes them more comfortable, and that helps them access their learning."

From middle schoolers to high school students, Melvin has a unique ability to put young people at ease. Andrea has noticed that even students who are normally guarded let down their walls around him. "They speak in cute voices to him, and they don't seem to be concerned how they are viewed by their peers," she explained. The staff feels the same way. "Several staff members are so happy to see him walk in the door every morning before students arrive. They get their 'Melvin time' before the bell rings or on passing periods or at lunch time."

For Andrea, Melvin is not just a calming presence but also a motivator and a bridge to learning. "Melvin helps motivate by calming students down and creating a comfortable space," she said. "When they are calm and comfortable, they can access their learning."

That impact is perhaps most powerful during moments of stress. Andrea recalled a recent example:

Melvin worked with a student last week who was having a hard time with anxiety. She was struggling to be in class during a science lab. She came to my classroom and got some Melvin time to calm down and then return to class.

Melvin also helps engage students who may otherwise be reluctant to participate. His joy and unconditional welcome open doors where traditional methods sometimes fall short. "The kids love him, and they are more willing to engage with him sometimes than adults or their peers," Andrea said. "So, he is able to connect with students more easily than adults at times."

The ripple effect of Melvin's presence goes beyond individual students. "Something I noticed when Melvin came to my classroom last year was that the kids were nicer to each other after he arrived," Andrea shared. Students bond over their shared affection for him, often discovering new common ground with classmates they may not have connected with before.

Staff members have also experienced the benefits. "I am surprised at how much the adults have taken to Melvin," Andrea admitted. "I have had teachers come in at lunch for time with Melvin, either to say hello or get some love if they are having a bad day."

Even small, everyday moments with Melvin have an outsized impact. "Melvin gets super excited to see people at the beginning of the day and he looks like he is dancing when he greets people," Andrea said. "The students and the teachers get really excited that he is so excited and happy to see them."

Looking ahead, Andrea hopes Melvin's role will only continue to grow.

66 My hope is that Melvin will continue to support students and that students will get more comfortable with him and rely on him even more as a trusted and reliable member of our school community. 99

In just a short time, Melvin has become a significant source of comfort, connection, and joy for everyone around him. As Andrea put it, "He has completely changed our school atmosphere for the better."


New Partnership Launches Puppy Raising Program at Washington Corrections Center for Women

Dogs for Better Lives and Prison Pet Partnership (PPP) have joined forces to launch a new Service Dog Puppy Raising program at the Washington Corrections Center for Women. The initiative, which began in late July 2025, places future Assistance Dogs with incarcerated women who will help raise and train them during their earliest months.

The program kicked off with three puppies, including Julia, the first pup placed in PPP's care. Two of the dogs will later return to DBL's Oregon campus for advanced training as Hearing Assistance, Autism Assistance, or Facility Dogs. The third will remain in PPP's established training track as a Service or Therapy Dog.

Both organizations emphasize that the program strengthens communities in multiple ways.

This program is a beautiful example of what happens when two missions intersect with purpose," said Gwen Dudek, DBL's Vice President of Program. Sam Zuanich, PPP's Training Director, added, "Working with DBL allows us to prepare more dogs for lives of service while empowering women with purpose and hope."


CHD Fern and Lauren

Kimberly shared how perfect Quest has been for her students, praising his calm demeanor and the sense of peace he brings to an otherwise busy elementary environment. Quest's presence has clearly made a lasting impact on the entire school community.

CHD - Certified Hearing Dog: Certified Hearing Dogs respond to sounds in the home and have public access with their person.

AAD - Autism Assistance Dog: Autism Assistance Dogs are specially trained to enhance the safety and well-being of children and families living with Autism by providing a minimum of three tasks to assist with keeping children grounded and focused while presenting a social bridge for relationships and friendships.

HHD - **Home Hearing Dog:** Home Hearing Dogs are trained to respond to sounds in the home but are not trained/certified to accompany their person in public.

FD - Facility Dog: Facility Dogs go to work with and assist professionals such as physicians, teachers, counselors, police officers, and child advocates.

With his playful spirit, love of fetch, and steady obedience, Williams is perfectly matched for this important role.

Certified Hearing Dog Magna has been placed with successor client Kathleen, whose previous partner, CHD Harper, sadly passed in March 2024.
