







A Family's Gift, Guided by a Love for Dogs

For Miranda Tollman and her family, philanthropy is a deeply personal journey guided by three passions: animals and wildlife, climate change, and supporting underprivileged children. When the family established their Donor Advised Fund, Dogs for Better Lives immediately stood out as an organization worthy of their support.

"We were deeply touched by the work that you do," Miranda shares. Having spent a decade on the board of a Los Angeles rescue nonprofit, she understands the challenges facing shelter animals and the transformative power of the human-animal bond. Competitive Hearts, Compassionate Impact

Randy and Nancy's love of dogs—and their passion for giving back—made DBL's Bone AppeTREAT the perfect opportunity to combine fun, friendship, and philanthropy. "First reason was my love for dogs. Then the wonderful cause of providing Assistance Dogs for families with autism and for d/Deaf individuals," Randy shares. This year's competition featured former Chamber of Commerce CEO's like Randy. And Randy knew three of his Bone AppeTREAT competitors personally.

Motivated by a lifelong competitive spirit, Randy and Nancy went above and beyond in their fundraising efforts. "I've been a fierce competitor all my life," Randy says, "and the thought of beating my friends in the competition really motivated me to be 'Top Dog!'" Their drive paid off, earning them the title of Top Fundraisers this year.

The experience was deeply meaningful for the couple. "After running two Chamber of Commerce's for over 38 years, I've had the opportunity to give back to so

many nonprofits," Randy explains. "Nancy and I are big dog lovers. We adore our 11-year-old Havanese, Buddy, and we also have a close friend who has a son with autism. This event was really special."

Their efforts drew overwhelming support from friends and colleagues, with more than 100 donors contributing and 40 attending their watch party to celebrate the announcement.

Reflecting on the experience, Randy encourages others to participate: "If you love dogs or know someone who is deaf or hard of hearing, or has a family member with autism, this event is for you. You can participate and raise money whether you are a contestant, donor, or volunteer!"

Through their enthusiasm, generosity, and playful competitive spirit, Randy and Nancy not only won the competition—they helped ensure Dogs for Better Lives can continue providing life-changing Service Dogs for families in need.

From Shelter to Service: Hazel's Journey with Tracee

When Tracee first met Hazel, she felt an instant connection. "I just wanted to pick her up and snuggle with her," she recalls. Hazel, a graduate of Dogs for Better Lives' From Shelter to Service Dog Program in Texas, entered Tracee's life just six months ago, and the two have since formed a bond built on trust, independence, and love.

A Partner in Every Step

Hazel is trained as a Hearing Assistance Dog, alerting Tracee to essential sounds like the doorbell, oven timer, and smoke alarm. But her impact goes far beyond her tasks. On their first trip together—navigating a shuttle, a busy airport, and a two-hour flight—Hazel remained calm and focused, giving Tracee a sense of security she'd long hoped for.

Even in everyday moments, Hazel proves invaluable. "When we are out walking, she will hear a car approach from behind when I don't. She will stop and look back—letting me know a car is coming."

Building Confidence and Connection

Hazel's presence has given Tracee greater independence and improved how others interact with her. "I no longer worry about missing the doorbell or carrying a timer," she says. "People show more politeness toward me. Without a Service Dog, if I say I'm deaf, many people just stop trying. With Hazel, they at least try." One store clerk even typed a message into his phone so Tracee could read it: "Beautiful dog, did you find everything you needed?"

A Bond Like No Other

Beyond practical support, Hazel has become Tracee's constant companion. "She is my best buddy. We are a team. She gives me the confidence to do things

I wouldn't attempt alone." With Hazel, Tracee now feels comfortable exploring her community and meeting new people.

The Power of Shelter Dogs

Hazel is Tracee's third DBL Service Dog and her second from a shelter. "Both were perfect in their sound work, obedience, and personality."

Tracee is deeply grateful to everyone who helped bring Hazel into her life, especially her foster parents. "They did an amazing job. They couldn't have matched me with a better dog."

Clover Brings Calm and Confidence to Enzo's Life

When Clover, an Autism Assistance Dog from Dogs for Better Lives, first met Enzo, the connection was instant. "They must have played up and down the hallway at least 50 times," recalls Enzo's mom, Nikki. "But on the first night when it was just us, Enzo leaned up to her in a way he hadn't allowed other dogs—that really moved me. It was overwhelming, so positive."

Since that day, Enzo and Clover have become inseparable. "Were it not for the fur, I would say Enzo and Clover were siblings! They play constantly," Nikki says. Clover has brought calm, confidence, and new routines into Enzo's life. "A great example is going to the dentist," she shares. "With Clover around, even without touching, Enzo is calmer and more willing to try things. This weekend, he allowed a full exam and cleaning."

Clover's specialized task work—touch, settle, visit, and squish—helps Enzo focus and regulate when he feels overwhelmed. Beyond that, she's teaching him valuable lessons about responsibility and connection. "He can do some light care for Clover—petting her, playing, and

turning on the faucet so she can drink," Nikki explains. "Caring for her helps him develop self-care skills. Clover is also teaching Enzo about relationships and the natural back and forth that's helping him form better connections with kids his age."

This summer, the family took a vacation to Seattle—something that once felt impossible. "Clover is a superstar with her vest on. I can encourage Enzo to "guide" her out in public and that really helps him focus and calm down," Nikki says.

From bedtime cuddles to family walks, Clover's presence has transformed daily life. "She comforts me too," Nikki adds. "Clover is pure love and an amazing addition to our family. For those who donate, we are so very thankful to you. This work really changes lives."

Bringing Courage, Comfort, and Calm to Charlevoix County

When Facility Dog Scully joined the Charlevoix County Prosecutor’s Office in early 2025, he didn’t just become part of the team—he transformed it. His handler, Jen, had dreamed of bringing a Facility Dog to the office for years. “We were absolutely delighted to receive Scully into our lives,” she says.

Working alongside victims of crime—especially children—can be emotional and intense. Scully’s calm, intuitive nature has already changed how those moments unfold. “People are often anxious when they come to our office,” Jen explains. “Having a positive interaction with Scully first helps set the tone. It tells them: *you’re safe here.*”

In the courtroom, Scully’s quiet strength offers a lifeline. He rests gently against a child’s leg or leans close enough to be felt—his warmth a steady reminder that they’re not alone. Jen recalls one young survivor who had been terrified to enter the courthouse. Before their first meeting, she drew a picture of the dog she hoped to meet. When she finally met Scully, her fear melted into fascination. **“She went from being afraid to even walk into our building to testifying—and looking forward to coming back,” Jen says. “That wouldn’t have been possible without Scully.”**



Scully’s presence in Charlevoix County was made possible entirely by the generosity of donors and volunteers. “We’re a small, rural office,” Jen says. “Our county budget could never have paid for something like this. Because of donors who believe in the impact of a working dog, we were able to bring Scully here at no cost to our office. You didn’t just bring a dog to our team—you brought hope, healing, and heart to our community.”

From Shelter to Service Dog Program Continues to Grow

Since its founding, Dogs for Better Lives has always trained shelter dogs to become Service Dogs, giving both dogs and people a second chance. This commitment continues with the expansion of our pilot From Shelter to Service Dog program, designed to improve the success rate of shelter dogs pursuing Service Dog roles. With the Atlanta Humane Society joining as the second shelter partner—following Operation Kindness in Carrollton, Texas—multiple dogs have already begun their journey from uncertain rescues to skilled candidates for Service Dog work.

Trainers in the program identify shelter dogs with the temperament and drive to assist people with disabilities. These dogs live with foster volunteers while receiving professional training, learning skills that prepare them to provide independence and companionship to future clients. Even dogs that do not complete the program graduate with enhanced abilities, improving their chances of adoption into loving homes.

Gwen Dudek, DBL's Vice President of Program, reflects on the new partnership: "Every dog we welcome from Atlanta Humane carries the potential to change a life. We are deeply grateful to the shelter and its team for giving these dogs a chance to shine, and to our volunteers who nurture them every step of the way."

Cal Morgan, President and CEO of Atlanta Humane, shares, "Partnering with Dogs for Better Lives is a remarkable opportunity for our shelter dogs. It gives them a second chance while making a profound difference in someone's life. We are proud to partner with DBL in this life-changing work."

Housed at Atlanta Humane's new Marietta location, the program allows dogs to train in a home-like environment, practicing real-life skills while building

confidence and trust. This collaboration expands DBL's reach, helping more Service Dogs find homes with people in need and giving shelter dogs a meaningful, life-changing purpose.

The From Shelter to Service Dog Program now operates in two locations: Operation Kindness in Carrollton, Texas and Atlanta Humane Society in Atlanta, Georgia.



Service Dogs Take Flight with Angel Flight West



Jet, born on May 30, 2025, is a jet-black Labrador Retriever who is being raised by a Puppy Raiser in Montana. The Angel Flight West Team looks forward to the opportunity to fly Jet to DBL's West Campus when it is time for him to enter training.

Since early 2025, Angel Flight West (AFW) have been helping to transport future Service Dogs across the western United States through a partnership with DBL that's already making a measurable impact. Through August, 15 volunteer pilots have transported 15 dogs to and from our training facility and to Puppy Raiser and Client homes, saving DBL roughly 172 staff hours in just eight months.

"Our volunteer pilots love flying these missions, which enable AFW to serve more people in a unique way — ensuring individuals with a variety of challenges receive the support of a service animal," says Jessica Hayes, Communications Director at AFW.

The partnership has already created heartwarming moments. One puppy, Jigsaw, embarked on a three-leg journey from Montana to Canada. Pilot Scott Warner recalled, "Jigsaw had a full day of flying and snuggles on his three-leg trip." As a playful tribute to the partnership,

DBL even named a puppy "Jet," celebrating the volunteers who make these flights possible.

For both organizations, the collaboration reflects the power of teamwork in the nonprofit world. Hayes explains, "Partnering with DBL gives our volunteer pilots the opportunity to use their passion, talents, and resources for good — all while helping transport DBL's precious canine cargo." By combining AFW's flight network with DBL's mission of providing life-changing service dogs, the organizations are overcoming transportation barriers and reaching more people than either could alone.

Looking ahead, both DBL and AFW are excited to grow the program, delivering more puppies and Service Dogs to those who rely on them. It's a partnership that highlights not just the joy of flying, but the profound difference a Service Dog can make in someone's life.

Leading with Passion for Service Dogs

For AJ, volunteering with Dogs for Better Lives was personal from the start. Two parts of DBL's mission resonate most: supporting people who rely on Service Dogs and ensuring the well-being of the dogs themselves. AJ explains, "I view animals as sentient beings and strongly believe they should be treated with respect and love. DBL encapsulates that in their training and placement of their dogs."

Taking on the role of Chair of the Northeast Regional Advisory Board (RAB) has allowed AJ to expand her impact on the mission. Working alongside like-minded RAB members and DBL staff, AJ describes the experience as truly fulfilling. "I feel fortunate to be part of a team that loves dogs and giving back— as a chair, I couldn't ask for a better group."

Watching DBL grow in the Northeast has been especially rewarding. From establishing a presence in Cape Cod to expanding in-person events across New England, AJ is enthusiastic about the progress. "We are building partnerships with community members and local businesses, which will help enhance our impact even further. Seeing the growth over the past few years has fueled my continued commitment."

The personal connection to DBL makes the work especially meaningful to AJ. "As someone who has benefited from the unconditional love and acceptance of a dog throughout my entire life, and has an autistic family member, being part of DBL affords me the ability to truly walk in my passion and purpose," AJ shares.

Through volunteering, AJ engages donors, community members, and fellow dog lovers—helping ensure DBL continues transforming lives through the unique bond between people and Service Dogs.

Raising the Next Generation of Service Dogs

“Puppy Raising has been one of the greatest joys of my life. If you are thinking about raising, definitely give it a shot.”

For Laura, raising Service Dog puppies has been a passion for more than two decades—and her latest puppy, Rooster, is no exception. “I love Golden Retrievers, and when I had the opportunity to raise one for Dogs for Better Lives, I decided to try out a new organization,” she says. “Rooster is the 16th puppy that I have raised.”

Rooster has brought a fresh burst of energy to Laura’s experience. “He is much more energetic than any of my previous 15 puppies, which made for some fun training sessions. The communication with Dogs for Better Lives staff has been exceptional, and I have enjoyed this experience,” she shares.

What Laura loves most about puppy raising is watching the puppies learn. **“When I am teaching them something and it clicks for them—that is always my favorite part. It’s also a lot of fun to have a puppy at the end of the leash on adventures around town.”**

Laura’s giving Rooster a “good luck tour” in their last month together before he turns in for professional training. Together they’re visiting local stores that supported his journey and sharing his playful personality with fans worldwide on Instagram. “People fell in love with his adorable morning greetings and fun personality. One of Rooster’s favorite places to play is the beach, and I’ll make sure he gets some beach time before he goes off to training!”

As Rooster prepares to enter formal training, Laura hopes he finds the path that suits him best. “I hope that Rooster enjoys training with his trainer and finds his perfect match.”



For those considering becoming a Puppy Raiser, Laura offers encouraging advice: “Puppy Raising has been one of the greatest joys of my life. If you are thinking about raising, definitely give it a shot. It’s a little over a year commitment, and it goes by very fast. And the heartbreak of turning in a puppy? Get another one—you’ll find it’s worth it!”

Leaving a Legacy of Love

For Mr. and Mrs. Haverly, their connection to Dogs for Better Lives began with personal experience and a deep appreciation for the bond between humans and dogs.

"I've been profoundly deaf in my right ear for 25 years," shares Mr. Haverly. **"Over the years, I've done a lot of research and reading about hearing loss. I started seeing DBL mentioned in the literature I was reading and became interested in following their work."**

That initial interest grew into a meaningful relationship with DBL. "After following DBL for several years pre-pandemic, I hosted a six-month-old Lab for DBL while their Puppy Raiser was on holiday," he recalls. "Of course, helping feels good."

Becoming Guardian Society members—those who include DBL in their estate plans—was a natural extension of the Haverlys' lifelong love of dogs and their belief in DBL's mission. "I hope our gift will enable DBL to reach more people and expand their good work," says Mr. Haverly.

From childhood days learning how to walk alongside his father's English Springer Spaniel to hosting Ezra, the black Lab from DBL, dogs have always been a part of Mr. Haverly's life. "I think it's a good idea to try to help and maybe leave the world a bit better place than when you arrived."

Through their legacy gift, the Haverlys' are ensuring that DBL can continue providing life-changing Service Dogs for years to come—helping people live with greater independence, safety, and connection.



Bridging Corporate Resources and Nonprofit Impact

Jacob Orchard, a member of Dogs for Better Lives' (DBL) Regional Advisory Board – Pacific Northwest, has long been driven to turn good intentions into real impact. “I became a Change Agent through my employment at Microsoft because I wanted to do more than just support causes—I wanted to help them thrive,” he shares. In this role, Jacob connects nonprofits like DBL with Microsoft resources, coaching them on how to maximize benefits available to qualified organizations.

He first learned about DBL through Microsoft's Give campaign and felt an immediate connection. “As a veteran who is also hard of hearing, their work really resonates with me on a personal level,” he explains. DBL's mission—providing Service Dogs to support independence, confidence, and accessibility—mirrored challenges he has faced firsthand, making the partnership deeply meaningful.

Over the years, Microsoft's support has grown beyond technology donations to include sponsorships, workplace events, and employee

giving. “What’s meant the most to me is seeing the relationship evolve beyond donations into real engagement,” Jacob notes. He recalls Hackathon events where employees collaborated to show DBL how technology could amplify their mission.

For Jacob, bridging corporate resources and nonprofit impact is personal. “Nonprofits often have incredible missions but limited resources to fully realize them. I see it as my responsibility to help close that gap,” he says. One standout moment was hearing about a Hearing Assistance Dog placed with a veteran: “Knowing that our efforts at Microsoft helped make that connection possible—through technology, funding, and advocacy—was a proud moment for me.”

Jacob encourages employees to start small and be intentional. “Share a story, highlight a nonprofit during Give month, or organize a simple event. Use the tools your company provides, like matching programs or volunteer days. Advocacy from one person can create a ripple effect that inspires others and drives real impact.”



Helping to Drive DBL's Mission Forward

Since 2016—back when Dogs for Better Lives was still known as Dogs for the Deaf—the Frog Crossing Foundation has had the pleasure of watching the organization grow and evolve as it expanded into Autism Assistance Dogs and Facility Dogs. The Foundation is also pleased to see DBL train rescued shelter dogs for service in addition to training puppies.

The Frog Crossing Foundation is a private foundation that provides grants to other deserving charitable organizations for the benefit of women, girls, and animals. The Foundation handpicks potential grant recipients and invites them to submit proposals for consideration that align with the Foundation's mission. Each proposal is then reviewed and considered at the Foundation's annual meeting, and grants are determined based on the Foundations' available resources and the intended use of the grant funds as detailed in the applicant's proposal.

While DBL informs the Foundation of its many new projects, DBL has asked the Frog Crossing Foundation to provide funding for specific practical and necessary projects like buying vans and supporting the new East Coast facility in Massachusetts. The Foundation

recognizes and appreciates DBL for its forward-thinking efforts to expand its programs and help more people and wishes DBL continued success as it strives to bring service dogs to people with disabilities and vulnerable populations.

Dogs for Better Lives has a small fleet of vehicles that our staff uses to transport our future Service Dogs to veterinary appointments, public training outings and even placement trips. The vehicles are all customized for the safety and comfort of our dogs and are used daily. DBL's vehicles are made possible by the combined support of donors and foundations like the Frog Crossing Foundation.

"Many people do not understand the blood, sweat, tears, and hard work that goes into making non-profit organizations like DBL work," Darcey said. "Many non-profits and their boards and employees are unsung heroes that need to be recognized for the amazing work that they do."


